- ** Enrichment activities extend children's learning through new experiences and opportunities that are key to academic success, personal and social development. Enrichment activities are just as important as academics. They both complement each other to develop well-rounded students and teach them life skills that will prepare them for the future.
- **Family Participation activities are monthly and encouraged and strengthened by daily parent/teacher communication

Social Focus: ADJUSTING TO SCHOOL

Infant: Separating from adults with ease, bonding with teachers, introduction to tummy time circle

Toddler: Adjusting to daily routines/ beginning to clean up after self, introduction

to group time **Preschool**: Adjusting to daily routines, handling one's emotions/ gaining self - control/cleaning up after self by putting toys back in correct areas/bins, putting

coat away, cleaning up after snack/lunch/project

STEM Activity: PUMPKIN EXPLORATION

Infant: Exploring pumpkins of various sizes and textures by touch and rolling them **Toddlers:** Exploring pumpkins of various sizes and textures by touch. Observe the outside of pumpkin, hold it to feel the weight, cut open and examine the inside (touch seeds, pulp) smell it.

Preschool: Exploring pumpkins of various sizes and textures by touch. Observe the outside of pumpkin, hold it to feel the weight, cut open and examine the inside (touch seeds, pulp) smell it. Use a spoon to scoop out seeds and save for later. Leave out to watch the rotting process/ record observations. Dissect a pumpkin, separate in divided dish, and label parts.

Math Concepts: COMPARE AND SORT LEAVES

Infant: Explore various types of leaves by using your senses (touch, hearing, smell, sight). Feel the smooth one, hear the crunchy one, smell them. crumble, see the fall colors

Toddler: Pass various types of leaves around to hold and feel. Discuss the colors, textures, and size (smooth, crunchy, small, big). What colors do you see? Which one is red? Look at this big one!

Preschool. Pass various types of leaves around to hold and feel. Discuss the colors, textures, and sizes and sort them by various attributes. Discuss which trees produce what leaves/shapes etc.

Enrichment: Multicultural Instruments /movements

Children follow rhythmic patterns and movements listening to the multicultural styles and rhythms while experimenting with various musical instruments.

Social Focus: KINDNESS & EMPATHY.

Infant: Make sure to find plenty of opportunities for your children to see you being kind and supportive, provide opportunities to connect with others, develop infant's trust in meeting their needs

Toddler: Encourage kind hands and words, demonstrate kind acts and helping others, provide words for children to express themselves "I'm mad", let children help with small tasks

Preschool: Help children deal with conflicts in less aggressive ways, help and support others. Encourage kind words and explain others' feelings because of a situation. Example: "When you got angry and yelled at Lucy, how do you think she was feeling?"

STEM Activity: FALL CINNAMON SLIME

Children help add ingredients to Cinnamon Slime Recipe Ingredients:

In a bowl, pour the entire 5 oz bottle of clear glue.

Add in ½ cup of water.

Add in 1/2 tsp baking soda and stir.

Add in the glitter. I used a mix of red and golds for a pretty fall finish.

Add a couple drops (Only a couple! That is all it will take!) of cinnamon essential oil.

Pour in some of the fall vase fillers.

Add 1 tbsp contact solution. It will instantly begin to form.

It will be STICKY! Don't panic! Mix the solution in the bowl until it starts to form.

Knead the slime until it is no longer sticky. Play and discover!

Store in an airtight container.

Enrichment: Read How to Catch a Turkey by Wallace and Elkerton, then introduce the activity: Draw, color and cut out a turkey, provide building material options for children to design a hiding place for Turkey. Use materials such as magnetic blocks, wooden blocks, foam blocks, etc. Create a fort or house for the turkey to hide/live in. It can be the pretend classroom pet!

Social Focus: TEACHABLE MOMENTS / CONFLIC

Infant: Model empathy, talk about feelings, label emotions with words, comfort and include child, model gentle hands, reassure child

Toddler: Let children know through your calm approach that conflicts are okay and that they can be resolved with help. Describe each child's facial expressions and make the same expression yourself. This can help toddlers feel more understood. Name feelings and talk them through the conflict. Calm them with gentle touches and a soft voice. Preschool: 1. Help identify the conflict (let each child state the problem) 2. Find potential solutions by asking each child how we can solve it 3. Reach a consensus and implement the agreed upon solution. In this approach, the teacher facilitates the problem-solving process by asking open-ended questions and allowing the children to generate their own solutions, "When do you want to share? "When can Tommy have a turn?" "How will Tommy know when you are done?" Kids become better problem solvers when they learn how to find solutions on their own.

STEM Activity: MELTING SNOWMAN

Infant: Child holds snowball in hand and lets the warmth of their hand melt the snow. (Solid to liquid). Tell child what is happening....

Toddler: Child holds snowball in hand and lets the warmth of their hand melt the snow. (Solid to liquid). Tell child what is happening. Offer different size snowballs (small, medium, larae) MATH

Preschool: Child holds snowball in hand and lets the warmth of their hand melt the snow. (Solid to liquid). Tell child what is happening explain melting /offer different size snowballs (small, medium, large) MATH. Extend experiment by demonstrating the impact temperature has on melting rates. Place one in freezer, one in the refrigerator, one at room temperature on a table. Ask where they think the snowballs will melt the most quickly and where he thought the snowballs will melt the slowest. They can write this down (or you can do this part for them). Set timer, check 3 snowballs and record results.

Math Concepts: S

Infant: Use "Math Talk" while introducing various Christmas bows by size and color. "This bow is big and red" This bow is small and green". Etc.

Stick one on the child's clothing, see if they attempt to pull it off!

Toddler: Use "Math Talk" while introducing various Christmas bows by size and color. "This bow is big and red" This bow is small and green". Etc. Toddlers stick the colored bows on matching-colored placemats or paper with encouragement and guidance from teachers.

Preschool: Children take out bows, organize in piles by color or size or both and then graph them by sticking them in correct column on the board. Children then identify small, medium, large bows and count each category.

Social Focus: CONFIDENCE AND HEALTHY SELF-IMAGE

Infant: Encourage and provide attempts, "You can do it" statements, smile, clap, show excitement when child reaches a goal or completes a task, comfort and promote effort

Toddler: Encourage and provide attempts, allow chances to try new things, "Mistakes are ok", try again, clap, smile, be specific with the compliment "You carried your own lunchbox" instead of good job. It's ok if it doesn't work, try something else.

Preschool: Build on their strengths, encourage them to complete a task, try again and again, never give up, never compare to others, teach and role model positive self-talk, be flexible, mistakes are ok, give specific praise "I liked how you chose to use that tube as a ramp for the marbles".

STEM Activity: THE SNOWY DAY SENSORY WALK

Infant: Paint infants' feet light blue /white, press feet on large paper (walkers can walk on large paper with support so they don't slip) create footprints in the snow like in the story the Snowy Day.

Toddler: Paint bottom of toddlers' feet (light blue/white) have toddlers walk all along paper tracking snow prints in the snow like in the story the Snowy Day.

Preschool: Children dip feet in (light blue/white) paint in a tray, they then track snow prints across a large sheet of paper. They can also paint the bottom of their own feet and each other's feet. When complete they step in a sudsy bucket to wash feet, towel dry!

Math Concepts: ICE CUBE SNOW BLOCKS/SUGAR CUBE DESIGNS (PS)

Infant: Ice cube tray snow blocks can be prepared ahead of time. Scoop snow into ice cube trays outside and bring it in for play. Dump the snow blocks out on tray or table and let the child explore by taste, touch. Demonstrate stacking snow blocks one on top of another. Offer vocabulary such as "cold", "snow" and "white".

Toddler: Ice cube tray snow blocks can be prepared ahead of time. Dump the snow blocks out on tray or table and let the child explore. Encourage vocabulary such as "cold", "snow" and "white". Encourage stacking snow blocks one on top of another. Add food coloring to extend interest and imagination.

Preschool: Thinking about the location and dimensions of objects and how they relate to one another will be developed while preschoolers stack and layer either ice cube tray snow blocks or sugar cubes to form igloos and snow structures. Add food coloring, toothpicks, straws etc. to extend learning and design possibilities. Add food coloring and pretend people to extend play.

Around the World:

What is an igloo? A type of shelter or hut built of compacted snow, typically built when the snow is suitable. They were often built by hunting parties to survive the extreme cold as well as for shelter in the winter months in small villages. The Inuit, better known to many as Eskimos invented the igloo centuries ago. The igloo was a means for hunters to survive brutal winters in a vast area spanning more than 3,500 miles, including eastern Siberia, Greenland, Alaska, and parts of Canada.

Enrichment: Bring snow inside and add ice cream scoopers and plastic dishes. Pretend ice cream shops can be so fun and creative. Add cool aid mix for smell and color. Older- create a menu of flavors and sizes to purchase from the ice cream

Social Focus: SELF-CARE The goal of self-care is for your child to begin to explore independence and what it looks like to care for their own needs in a self-directed manner.

Infants: Introduce developmentally appropriate activities to begin feeding the infant's natural desire for learning and independence, provide opportunities to foster growth by providing a comfortable environment feed, sleep, grooming, explore, grasp, climb, crawl, walk, and balance. Allow for child-directed exploration.

Toddler: Introduce developmentally appropriate activities to use the toilet, wash hands, put on and take off coats, clean up after self, wipe nose, use a spoon and generally function in a classroom environment.

Preschool: Introduce developmentally appropriate activities to encourage independence in getting own lunch box, hanging up coat, dressing self, using the bathroom, cleaning up toys/after self, wash hands/face, blowing nose, filling own thermos, preparing bedding on cot, using scissors, getting own silverware, opening own snacks etc.

Math Concepts: SIZE

Infant: Infants begin to learn about size by recognizing that some things are small, and some are big by sight and touch. Provide materials for exploration.

Toddler: Toddlers learn about size by exploring and using sorting cups (graduated sizes) stacking toys, various size balls, nesting toys. Which one is big? Small?

Preschool: Preschoolers use materials of various sizes: Counters (bears, dinosaurs, etc.), sorting by size, puzzles, tangrams, measuring cups, unit building blocks, Legos (ordering by size, sorting by size, ordering by short to tall, sm./med./lg sorting

STEM Activity: TYPES OF LANDFORMS (volcano, hills, island, canyon, desert, ocean, jungle, mountains, marshes, river, waterfall, plain)

Infant: Touch and feel various rocks (bumpy, smooth), fingerpaint a landform **Toddler:** Touch and feel various rocks (bumpy, smooth), use playdough to form a mountain, volcano or hill, place out felt pieces as body of water blue(water) and green (grass) with play animals, water table, sand table with animals or people, paint a landform using hands, brushes, sponges etc.

Preschool: Discuss types of landforms, how they form and locations. Geology activities can include an erupting volcano, land form diorama, or making a landform scene with your class using sand, clay, , playdough , various collage materials (Infant and toddler activities can also be used) Additional Fizzy Waterfalls Activity: Line a cookie sheet with aluminum foil. Flip Mega Blocks over so that you can fill them with baking soda. Let kids squirt vinegar into the blocks using a squirt bottle or eye droppers

Social Focus: EMPATHY TOWARDS OTHERS

Infants: Babies illicit a natural sense of empathy, so give a voice to those who can't speak for themselves. Explore with them different human emotions. "You seem sad... you friend is mad...you seemed scared... you look so happy"! The first step to successfully empathizing with others is being able to identify one's own feelings!

Toddlers: - Kids can't empathize with what others are feeling if they don't know how to put words to their own emotions (vocabulary). "You seem sad... you friend is mad...you look scared... you are so happy"!

Preschool: Use the six steps of conflict resolution to guide children to understanding others' perspectives during conflict, and how to value other people's opinions and ideas just as they value their own. 1. **Neutralize the situation** 2. **Gather information** 3. **Define the problem** 4. **General solutions/ideas** 6. **Evaluate ideas** 7. **Decide on solution or plan and follow through**

*All ages read books that build empathy. Empathy describes a person's ability to emotionally understand what someone else is going through. An empathetic person can see things from another person's point of view.

Math Concepts: MATH TALK IN THE CLASSROOM

Children form ideas about math through everyday experiences and, most importantly, through interactions with trusted adults. Language—how we talk with children about math ideas like more, empty, and full—matters.

Infant: I'll put the blocks in the bucket; you dump them out. I put the blocks back in the bucket; you dump them out!"

Toddler: Let's sort! Let's put the blocks in the bucket and cars in the basket.

Preschool: I have more crackers than you do. See, I have 1, 2, 3 and you have 1, 2. I'm going to eat one of mine. Now I have the same as you!"

Stem Activity: OOBLECK

Oobleck with cornstarch and water is a classic science activity every kid needs to experience. This Easter oobleck experiment explores the question: What are the properties of a non-Newtonian Fluid? Oobleck is a combination of cornstarch and water. The oobleck recipe is one cup of water and one cup of cornstarch, sometimes an additional 1/2 cup of cornstarch is needed to thicken mixture. Add plastic Easter eggs to explore the properties of the oobleck substance.

Social Focus: SELF REGULATION

Self-regulation is the ability to understand and manage your behavior and your reactions to feelings and the things happening around you.

Infants and toddlers: Infants and young children cannot regulate their emotions on their own, they need loving adults in their lives to help them immediately regulate their emotions and behaviors and learn skills to do so independently. As an adult model behavior such as be responsive, be patient, talk about emotions, sooth and help them self sooth and keep a routine.

Preschool: Role model and provide calm down strategies (tools to manage behavior): Encourage taking deep breaths and counting backwards from 5 Have clear rules that help your child understand what behavior you expect – for example, 'Use your words to show your feelings'. Praise your child when they show self-control and follow the rules. For example, 'I liked the way that you shared with Sam when he asked'.

Math Concepts: ASTEROID VELOCITY THROW (motion, force, direction)

Infants: Place a large bucket with a wide opening or a low laundry basket on the floor. Have balls of aluminum foil(asteroids) prepared to use for the child to try to throw in the basket. The youngest may need a teacher to help hold and guide throwing ball in the basket. Make sure balls are large enough to not cause any safety issues and remove after game.

Toddlers: Place a large bucket with a wide opening or a low laundry basket on the floor. Have balls of aluminum foil(asteroids) prepared to use for the child to try to throw in the basket. Older can also use a cardboard with a large hole cut out from it as a target to aim for (prepared ahead) Use speed, motion, and direction vocabulary words with the child such as throw" fast", "slow", throw "hard" gentle", throw "in" the hole, throw" forward" etc.

Preschoolers: Place a large bucket with a wide opening or a low laundry basket on the floor. Have balls of aluminum foil(asteroids) prepared to use for the child to try to throw in the basket. Older can also use a cardboard with a large hole cut out from it as a target to aim for (prepared ahead) Use speed, motion, and direction vocabulary words with the child such as throw" fast", "slow", throw "hard" gentle", throw "in" the hole, throw" forward", "The asteroid is moving toward the hole through space", it's picking up speed and moving with force".

Preschool: Go on a nature walk to find natural items (branches, rocks) Paint them using sponges, brushes, toothbrushes etc.) Add glitter, glue on gems, etc. Turn branch into a mobile when dry by hanging painted shells

Infants and toddlers: Encourage the first step, the attempt to dress self, the child that throws away their own trash, the child that sat through a story, the child who used the potty etc. Compliment every child when you catch them following directions, playing cooperatively, sharing, saying nice words to others, treating others with kindness, etc. Always phrase guidance in a positive way and tell child what you want them to do": "Nice hands, inside voices, sand in the bucket, we throw balls not toys.

Preschool: Praise every child when you catch them following directions, playing cooperatively, sharing, saying nice words to others, treating others with kindness, etc.

Be specific in your praise, instead of saying "good job!"- "I saw that you shared your blocks with Sally, that was kind of you." Always phrase guidance in a positive way and tell child what you want them to do or what is expected": Walking feet vs. no running, quiet voices vs. no screaming, feet on the ground vs. get down, gentle hands vs. no hitting.

Math Concepts: Relationship between numbers and the quantity they represent Infants: Focus on the concept of 1. "Here is 1 cookie", "I see 1 block", "Can you

give me one?" Count 1 of something in a book.

Toddlers: Focus on 1-5, older 1-10 count out 5 blocks, 5 crackers, 5 fingers search for numbers 1-5 in books and count 1-5 objects to familiarize children with numbers and that they represent an amount

Preschoolers: Recognize numbers 1-20+ by sight, count the number of objects they represent by having children count blocks one to one (each block is a number) Trace numbers, number bingo, number puzzles, number spots on floor to stand (child tells you what number their on)

Stem Activity: What is a Rainbow?

Infants: Colors in the sky- Name the colors that make up a rainbow and point to some rainbows in books, if one is in the sky show the children

Toddlers: A rainbow is **an arc of color in the sky that can be seen when the sun shines through falling rain.** The pattern of colors starts with red on the outside and changes through orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo, and violet on the inside. Review the colors that make up a rainbow and point to some rainbows in books, if one is in the sky show the children.

Preschool: A rainbow is a meteorological phenomenon that is caused by reflection, refraction (bending of light) and dispersion of light in water droplets resulting in a spectrum of light appearing in the sky. It takes the form of a multicolored circular arc. Rainbows caused by sunlight always appear in the section of sky directly opposite the Sun. The pattern of color starts with red on the outside and changes through orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo, and violet on the inside.

Social Focus: Adventure Role Play- Kids love to mimic adults and pretend to play roles, and in the process, they learn about life. Pretend components such as dress up clothes, home life props, occupation items and costume props help them do just that.

Infants: Encourage children to mimic you, place pretend food items in the shopping basket, drink from a cup, talk on phone to order a pizza, put on a hat on to become a cowboy etc.

Toddlers: Entice children to join in role playing in the family life center by setting up an ice cream shop or bakery. Have dress up clothes available to dress as a server, chef, baker, or customer. Encourage children to role play by placing trying on clothing, costumes, place pretend muffins in a basket, drink from a cup, talk on phone to order a pizza stir the ingredients in a bowl

Preschool: Have menus, clip boards crayons and paper, cash register, phones, and pretend scanners. Offer pretend food, aprons, dress up clothes/costumes. Add items found in an eatery (oven mitts, bowls, spoons, muffin tins, pizza boxes, ice cream scoops, dishes, baskets etc.) encourage positions such as cashier, customer, worker, chef etc.... role modeling "I would like to buy 1 muffin please", can you bake it for me chef?"

Math Concepts: ROTE COUNTING /ONE TO ONE Rote counting and counting with one-to-one are quite different. Rote counting is just reciting the numeral names in order, "One, two, three, four, five" (up to age 3) Counting with oneto-one involves touching each object and saying the numeral name aloud, which is a much more complex skill for young children.

Infants and toddlers: Provide plastic fish and water in a bucket for them to place fish in and out. Count as the child places in the fish (One, two, three) familiarize infants with math vocabulary and the concept of each fish has a number word associated with it. Toddlers can count along with teacher (one, two, three, four, five) and when child takes out count backwards (Five, four, three, two, one) "ALL GONE".

Preschool: Children can independently roll the dice and count out the corresponding number of fish to place in the water. Point at objects and count them as the same time. They can also count backwards(subtraction) when they take them out. They can work with a classmate too. One rolls the dice and the other counts them out. (Older can use Swedish fish)

STEM: Ice Cube Melting while painting (solid—Liquid)

Teachers: Plan and freeze ice cubes the night before. Instead of ice cube trays, fill dixie cups with water and drops of paint so the ice block is larger (peel off the cup to reveal block when ready). Place popsicle stick handle in before freezing. Use white construction paper.

Arts Medium: Potato stamper- Cut potato in half and stick a popsicle stick in it for child to use as a handle. Dip in paint and stamp potato on paper

Social Focus: LEARNING THROUGH PLAY

Infants, Toddlers and Preschool:

Play is one of the most important ways in which young children gain essential knowledge and skills. Play sets the foundation for the development of critical social and emotional knowledge and skills. Through play, children learn to forge connections with others, and to share, negotiate and resolve conflicts, as well as learn self-advocacy skills. Play also teaches children leadership as well as group skills. Furthermore, play is a natural tool that children can use to build their resilience and coping skills, as they learn to navigate relationships and deal with social challenges as well as conquer their fears. In the classroom, teachers will provide ample opportunities to explore, take risks, try new things, communicate with peers and teachers, gain confidence, and apply concepts of quantity, science, and movement to real life.

Math Concepts: PATTERNS AND REPEATING RYTHMS

Infants: Children are never too young to be engaged in finding patterns or hearing rhythms. Clap a pattern such as one clap and two fast claps or tap knees then clap hands. Can you do that? Encourage the child to mimic it back to you.

Toddlers: Toddlers can mimic patterns the teacher does like clapping 3 times or jumping to the left, then right, then left and then right. They can observe repeating patterns like a block standing, block lying flat, block standing, block lying flat, etc.

Preschool: Create AB patterns like cat/dog/cat/dog/ or more complex patterns like ABC, ABC; AABB, AABB; AAB, AAB; ABB, ABB.

Stem: EXAMINE THE INSIDE OF A WATERMELON

Infants: Children can touch the watermelon before it's cut and feel the smooth rind They can then taste watermelon at snack and talk with the babies using vocabulary describing the watermelon: It's juicy, it's red, it tastes sweet, it's good for your body.

Toddlers: What's inside? Cut open a watermelon, place a slice on each child's plate and ask them to try to take out seeds, older kids attempt to use a spoon to dig them out. Cut slice into 2 pieces and show children they now have 2 watermelons count them 1,2. Enjoy the taste and talk with the toddlers using vocabulary describing the watermelon: It's juicy, it's red, it tastes sweet, it's good for your body, it's mushy.

Preschool: Hold the watermelon, discuss the properties of it: smooth, heavy, round or oval, green or yellow, ripe or not yet. Make predictions on how many seeds are inside, will it be mushy? wet? Sticky? Smelly? Discuss simple fractions: I have 1 whole watermelon, I cut it in half and now I have how many? I cut that half in half and now I have how many? Etc. Children enjoy sliced watermelon and can count how many seeds are in their slice.
